In order to give full force and effect to the proxy you have stated you intend to give to the Chicago Tribune upon the Sun's application for membership in the AP, it will be necessary for you to insert above your signature in the management proxy which was sent you on or about March 19 or any other proxy you may hereafter sign the following language: quote Excepting, however, this proxy does not cover or apply to applications for membership where a proxy may heretofore have been or may hereafter be given to another by the undersigned unquote.

We are informed that the management of the Associated Press is sending out proxies for you to sign. This the management does in accordance with its custom. You may [fol. 695] properly wish to sign the management proxy; but, in order that it does not conflict with the proxy which we have already sent you and which you (may) have already signed and returned to us, we wish you would write in at the end of the first paragraph of the management proxy the following language:

“except upon applications for membership where a proxy may heretofore have been or may hereafter be given to another by the undersigned.”

Please insert this language in *any other* proxy you may hereafter execute.

If you have signed and forwarded the management proxy without writing in the above language, it will be necessary for you to reexecute the Tribune proxy, a copy of which we are enclosing. Please note that the last sentence of the enclosed proxy provides as follows:

“I hereby revoke any and all proxies heretofore given by me in so far as the same relate to the election of Marshall Field as owner of The Chicago Sun to membership.”

This allows the management proxy or any other proxy you may execute to stand with respect to all matters except the election of Marshall Field to membership and constitutes Colonel McCormick your proxy only with respect to this subject-matter. This I believe is your intent.

Would you mind advising us just what action you have taken.

(f) Many members upon receiving the proxy from the management of The Associated Press, the proxies sent by the Tribune Company, and the wires and letters sent by the Tribune Company referred to above

became confused and added the suggested insertion to the proxies sent to them by the Tribune Company. [fol. 696] Because of this confusion the Tribune Company sent a new proxy form to each member from whom it had prior thereto received a proxy. A copy of such proxy form is hereto attached and made a part hereof as Exhibit 13, and a copy of the form letter which accompanied such new proxy form is hereto attached as Exhibit 14.

Dear:

We have received from you a proxy against the application of the Chicago Sun for membership in the Associated Press. This proxy is, of course, very much appreciated.

Apparently, however, our communication with regard to the protection of this proxy by the insertion of certain wording in *other* proxies was not clear. The quotation was not intended for use on the Tribune proxy, but only on any proxy which you might issue to some other party after signing our proxy.

Therefore, a new proxy form is enclosed. Will you please have it executed and returned to me? If, after filling out this new Tribune proxy, you issue another proxy to anyone else on any other subject for use at the Associated Press meeting, will you please insert above your signature in such other proxy the following language:

[fol. 698] "Excepting upon applications for membership where a proxy has been or may hereafter be given to another by the undersigned."

(Do *not* add this language to the enclosed Tribune proxy.)

We are sorry to bother you again but your adherence to the above precautions will eliminate all questions concerning your position.

Interrogatory 7: List the names of all AP members from whom the Tribune Company or any of its officers, employees or representatives, or persons acting in behalf of the Tribune Company or Robert Rutherford McCormick, requested votes or proxies to be cast at the annual meeting of AP members held in April 1942 upon the application of Marshall Field for membership in The Associated Press, and state with regard to each AP member so requested (a) whether the request was written or oral, (b) the individual who made the request and the date thereof, (c) the substance of the request and of the response thereto, (d) whether a proxy was given as a result of the request and, if so, to whom, and (e) whether the vote of the member was cast, in person or by proxy, in opposition to the election of Marshall Field.

Answer:

A

These defendants are advised and believe that no specific requests for votes or proxies were made in connection with the reasons given by defendant McCormick, W. E. Macfarlane, or Elbert M. Antrim in opposition to the election of Marshall Field referred to in the answer to Interrogatory 6 above. If any such statements may be construed as requests for votes, however, then these defendants state:

(a) They do not know the names of the members of The Associated Press to whom such statements were made. They were made as stated above to members [fol. 699] who asked the position of these defendants with respect to Field's application. Some members, without any request from the Tribune or any of its employees, stated that they were opposed to Field's elec-

tion and gave their reasons for being so opposed. No record was kept of these conversations. These defendants believe such statements were made to not more than twenty members, if that many.

(b) The statements were oral.

(c) The individuals who made the statements are named above. The dates upon which such statements were made are not remembered.

(d) The substance of the statements is set forth in the answer to Interrogatory 6 above. The responses to said statements are not remembered.

(e) These defendants do not know whether a proxy was given as a result of such statement.

(f) These defendants do not know whether the votes of the members to whom such statements were made were cast in person or by proxy in opposition to the election of Marshall Field.

B

Arch Ward, an employee of the Tribune Company, made a speech at the annual meeting of members in opposition to the election of Marshall Field to membership as set forth in the answer to Interrogatory 6. If said speech is to be construed as a request for votes, then such request was made to all members of The Associated Press present at such meeting.

C

The Tribune Company, through its employees and representatives, as set forth in the answer to Interrogatory 6, interviewed members of The Associated Press. With respect to such interviews these defendants state:

(a) These defendants did not compile any record of the members of The Associated Press so interviewed, and these defendants are, therefore, not now certain as to the names of all such members. These defendants are advised and believe, however, that such interviews were had with representatives of those newspapers, the names of which are preceded by an asterisk in ink, set forth on pages 23 to 68 of "The Associated Press Directory January 1940" hereto attached and made a part hereof, as Exhibit 14A.

Such interviews were had during the period from the middle of February to the first of April, 1942. These defendants have no information from which the exact date of each interview can be ascertained.

(d) The instructions given to such employees and representatives are set forth above in the answer to Interrogatory 6. These defendants are informed and believe that each of its said employees and representatives substantially followed such instructions in most of such interviews. Defendants are further informed [fol. 718] and believe that in a few instances some employees and representatives exceeded such instructions and stated to members interviewed some of the reasons these defendants opposed the election of Marshall Field to membership, which reasons are above set forth in the answer to Interrogatory 6.

These defendants do not know the statements made by the members of The Associated Press in the course of such interviews. These defendants are informed and believe, however, that members interviewed who informed such employees and representatives that they were opposed to the election of Field stated one or more of the following as their reasons:

(1) Election of Marshall Field would not be in the best interests of The Associated Press because (a) Chicago has a sufficient number of members and the addition of one more would not benefit the Association from the standpoint of news coverage or otherwise; (b) The Chicago Sun is one of the world's poorest excuses as a metropolitan newspaper and the prestige of the Association would be damaged by making it a member; (c) it is not in the interest of The Associated Press to hand around memberships to rich men's sons as playthings; (d) if The Associated Press can be compelled to accept Field as a member, it can be forced to take in any applicant, which is contrary to the principle upon which the Association was founded, operates to destroy the value of memberships therein, and will result in the dissolution of the Association.

(2) Marshall Field is not qualified to become a member of The Associated Press. He is not a legitimate publisher operating as any other publisher. This is [fol. 719] shown by his record with PM and the poor showing of The Chicago Sun. It is shown by his hiring of personnel from other newspapers at far higher salaries and otherwise attempting to publish a newspaper without any thought of economics. Many objected that Field was not a newspaper man but only a rich young man trying to kick the entire industry around with his wealth, aided by income tax savings.

(3) Field started his newspaper for the sake of a political faction and this should not be encouraged where it is inspired by an administration in power and where there is no apparent likelihood of permanency of publication. Some members stated they thought Field was influenced by the administration in power to use his tremendous fortune for the dual purpose of supporting that administration and attacking and try-

ing to destroy an existing member of The Associated Press which was opposed to the administration. In this connection several members pointed to the fact that Field had not acquired a plant or press with which to publish The Chicago Sun. Many members believed themselves supported in this conclusion by the fact that operatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation had called upon them, which such members interpreted as an attempt on the part of the Government and particularly of the Antitrust Division of the Department of Justice to intimidate them into voting in favor of Field's application. One publisher exclaimed, "I'll not be intimidated. By God, this is America!" Many members stated that the activities of the Government and of Field in connection with his application for membership [fol. 720] ship were not in keeping with customary and well-recognized principles of fair play.

These defendants are informed and believe that members interviewed, who informed such employees and representatives that they were in favor of the election of Field, stated one or more of the following as their reasons:

1. Everybody should be admitted to membership that applies, so the rate will be cheaper.
2. Many members stated that they were in favor of the election of Field because they disliked these defendants. One member is reported to have stated that "had somebody else been involved, he would have voted against Marshall Field."
3. Field should be elected to membership in order to prevent the Department of Justice from filing suit against The Associated Press regardless of the merits of the controversy.
4. Some members stated that the Association should become more liberal and permit all applicants to become members, particularly because many papers are failing and new ones should be encouraged.

(e) The Tribune Company received proxies totalling 194 votes against the election of Field to membership. A list of the members of The Associated Press furnishing such proxies is hereto attached and made a part hereof as Exhibit 15.

Duplicate carbon copies of all such news items are transmitted to The Associated Press in the manner above described. William K. McKay of the Chicago Tribune editorial department has charge of transmitting such news from Monday to and including Friday of each week and John P. Gallagher has charge on Saturday and Sunday.

(d) The daily average net circulation of the Chicago Tribune increased in September, 1939, over the circulation in August, 1939, as shown in Exhibit 18. These defendants believe that some part of such increase was due to the discontinuance of publication of the Chicago Herald-Examiner, but these defendants are unable to state the extent of such increase due thereto because of other factors contributing to increased circulation, such as the outbreak of the present war.
