[fol. 864] "36. Describe in detail the steps taken by The Associated Press, if any, to insure that the local news which it obtains from its members is rendered complete, accurate and unbiased before it is reported by The Associated Press to its members.

Ans. The steps taken by AP to insure that the local news which it obtains from its members is complete, accurate and unbiased before it is reported by AP to its members include:

- 1. Careful selection and training of personnel including, where appropriate, one or more individuals on member papers.
- 2. Careful checking of the news at its source by a member or members of the staff.
- 3. Examination and supervision of the report by the responsible editors in charge.
- 4. Continuing examination and supervision at all bureaus or relay points through which the report passes.

Local news is reported to the bureaus of AP by member papers either by telephone, telegraph or carbon copy. Customarily each member paper designates one or more resonsible news employes who transmit the local news to the nearest AP bureau. Such member news employes are instructed by AP news executives in the requirements involved in the production of a complete accurate and unbiased news report.

It is the responsibility of the AP bureau staff to check as to authenticity, accuracy and completeness and to edit or rewrite the report in accordance with the requirements of the members on the wire on which the report is to be transmitted. Depending upon the character and nature of an event and the variation in member requirements, a report will be further edited at the bureaus and relay points through which it successively passes.

[fol. 865] Members of the staff of AP are almost invariably selected from those who have had prior experience on daily newspapers. Regardless of prior experience, however, each passes through a probationary period which includes training in the standards, requirements and processes of AP under the news executive of the bureau.

Upon receipt of the report from a member paper, the AP staff editor seeks such assurance as to the authenticity, accuracy and completeness of the report as appears to be necessary in the circumstances. Such steps may include interrogation of the member newspaper employe or direct contact with the source of the news or appropriate channel of information by telephone, telegraph or the use of an AP staff reporter from the bureau. The report is then prepared by editing or revising in the light of these inquiries. The report so edited and revised is further examined by a supervisor and by a wire editor. In each bureau, the final responsibility rests upon the bureau chief.

As the report passes through the hands of editors and supervisors at other bureaus and at relay points, it is their responsibility also critically to examine each item of news in order that there may be assurance of no oversight in prior handling.

"37. State approximately what proportion of the local news supplied The Associated Press by its members is (a) edited and (b) substantially rewritten by employes of The Associated Press before redelivery to AP members."

Ans. Before delivery to AP members, local news supplied the AP by its members is edited and substantially rewritten as described in the answers to Interrogatories 36 and 40.

"38. Describe in detail the steps taken by The Associated Press, if any, to insure that the news obtained by The Associated Press through its own facilities, or by purchase or exchange from other sources, is rendered comfol. 866] plete accurate and unbiased before it is reported by the Associated Press to its members."

Ans. The steps taken by AP to insure that the news obtained by AP through its own facilities or by purchase or exchange from other sources is complete, accurate and unbiased prior to delivery by AP to its members, are similar in nature to those described in the Answer to Interrogatory 36. Variation in these steps will depend upon the agency through which the news is transmitted to the Bureau.

In the case of news obtained by the staff of a bureau, the reporters, editors, supervisors and bureau chief follow the successive steps as outlined in Answer to Interrogatory 36 and exercise the necessary diligence and care required to fulfill their individual responsibilities.

In the case of news obtained by purchase, as from a "string" correspondent, the staff of the bureau exercises the same diligence in checking, verifying, questioning and supplementing the report as outlined in the Answer to Interrogatory 36.

In the case of news obtained by exchange, AP editors study and appraise the report for possible bias, inaccuracy and lack of completeness and follow the same process of checking and verifying outlined in Answer to Interrogatory 36, taking such additional steps of similar nature as appear appropriate.

In the case of news obtained by exchange with a foreign news agency, the report from such agency is examined by a special staff or group of AP editors sensitized by long years of experience in detecting the doubtful or spurious. When an editor feels that the report should be questioned, steps are taken to verify the news either through AP newsmen in the field or through independent channels. Should full verification not be possible but the subject matter of the report be considered of sufficient public interest, The Associated Press may carry the report but attribute [fol. 867] it to the foreign news agency from which it was received with a notation that it has not been confirmed or with such qualifications as appear necessary to indicate that The Associated Press is not vouching for the completeness, accuracy and freedom from bias of the report. Such qualifications include any and all pertinent information obtained by AP in its efforts to verify the report at the source.

"39. Name the points in the United States at which The Associated Press condenses, classifies, and rewrites its own news reports received from other points for the purpose of furnishing a condensed, classified, and rewritten report of the news to AP members at other points."

In addition, such condensation, classification, and rewriting is from time to time done at other points as the exigencies of particular news events may require.

"40. Describe in detail the typical operations of the employees of The Associated Press located at points referred to in Interrogatory No. 39 in condensing, classifying, and rewriting AP news reports."

Ans. In AP bureaus certain news employes are assigned to "rewrite", whose function it is to receive, classify, condense and rewrite the report for retransmission. Such employes analyze a news story in the light of member requirements and interest and verify or check any phase of the news story as appears appropriate. In preparing the story a "rewrite" editor first outlines or summarizes the main facts into what is called the "lead". He then marshals the essential facts into a rounded description of the event about which he is writing. The most important details are covered in the early part of the story and others follow in the order of their importance.

The news judgment of the "rewrite" man, based upon his experience, determines the amount of detail he includes in each particular story. This news judgment embraces a first-hand knowledge of the news interests of his region as a whole.

In the typical AP bureau the story goes from the "re-write" man to a general news supervisor and to the wire editors in the bureau. Each wire editor edits the story in accordance with his expert knowledge of the news interest in the region served by the particular wire over which he [fol. 871] has supervision. For example, a wire editor in charge of the wire serving member newspapers in Wisconsin, may, as a result of his experience, conclude that a particular story of 500 words which has been edited to 76

words by the wire editor supervising the wire to member, newspapers in Minnesota, is, nevertheless, worth 300 words to the member newspapers in Wisconsin whose needs he is supplying. He edits the story accordingly.

In bureaus that serve AP members in smaller communities there are in addition, news employes who prepare an even more condensed report for transmission by telephone or telegraph to such AP members. These employes exercise a keen perception of news requirements and classify and edit the news in order to make certain that every such AP member receives a report which highlights all of the day's news and is at the same time in keeping with their requirements for lesser volume.

[fol. 878] In view of the definition and interpretation of the phrase "such news as is spontaneous in its origin" contained in Section 4, no further definition or interpretation has been made. Discussions concerning the said phrase have taken place from time to time at various meetings of The Associated Press and its Board of Directors, as appears from the verbatim minutes of such meetings, copies of which have been made available to plaintiff.

"46. State whether The Associated Press has ever promulgated rules or instructions to guide AP members in complying with their obligation to furnish The Associated Press with reports of local news of spontaneous origin and, if it has, state such rules or instructions, and, if it has not, state what methods or arrangements exist to insure the fulfillment of such obligation."

Ans. The Associated Press has not promulgated such rules or instructions. The method and the arrangement which exist to insure the fulfillment of the obligation of members under Section 4, Article VIII, of The Associated Press By-laws are that upon election a member shall assent to the By-laws and agree to be bound thereby.

"47. State whether or not The Associated Press entered into a contract dated November 1, 1935, with The Canadian Press, and state whether Exhibit No. 1 attached hereto and made a part hereof, is a correct copy of such contract."

Ans. The Associated Press entered into a contract dated November 1, 1935 with The Canadian Press. Exhibit No. 1 attached to the Interrogatories is a correct copy of such contract.

"48. State the substance of the amendments, if any, to the contract referred to in Interrogatory No. 47."

Ans. There have been no amendments to the contract referred to in Interrogatory No. 47.

[fol. 879] "49. State whether or not the contract referred to in Interrogatory No. 47 is now in effect, and if it is not, give the date of its termination."

Ans. The contract referred to in Interrogatory No. 47 is now in effect.

"50. State whether or not The Associated Press in its Directory for 1934 made the following statement: 'The Canadian Press is the cooperative of the daily newspapers of Canada, including within its membership practically every daily in the Dominion, numbering in all about 100.'"

Ans. The Associated Press in its directory for 1934 made the statement quoted in Interrogatory No. 50.

"51. State whether, or to what extent, the statement set forth in Interrogatory No. 50 (a) was true when made and (b) is now true."

Ans. The truth of the statement set forth in Interrogatory No. 50 depends upon the definition of "practically". There were daily newspapers in the Dominion of Canada in 1934 which were not members of The Canadian Press. On September 15, 1942 there were 87 regular members of The Canadian Press and 1 associate member. As of February 12, 1943 there were at least 7 daily newspapers in the Dominion of Canada which were not members of The Canadian Press.

Ans. The AP newsphoto service provides newspicture coverage of general and regional subjects currently in the news. Delivery is by wire, mail or other methods appropriate to particular deliveries. Delivery by wire was inaugurated January 1, 1935. At the end of 1942, 112 AP members were receiving the full, general newsphoto service. Distribution of newspictures of regional character is included in the service but limited to those sections interested in the subject matter. No one member receives the entire output of newspictures.

- (q) No record is kept of the number of pictures gathered or received by AP.
- (d) No cumulative record is kept to show the number of pictures received from other organizations. The relative importance of newspictures and organizations supplying the same constantly changes by reason of changes in the current importance of news and the availability of newspictures of currently important events.

- (f) Approximately 300 weekly. The newspictures delivered by means other than by wire are substantially the same as the newspictures delivered by wire.

Ans. The Associated Press has not kept such reports or records.

"55. Ans. Proofsheet service—This consisted of twelve pages a week, divided between morning and afternoon papers, and devoted to news, sports and women's page features. The pages carried an average of about 50 column inches of art of various kinds and about 3,600 words of reading matter each. In addition, the service included the daily fiction serial story of a 1,200 word chapter each day, and the daily radio program page. The service cost \$145,448.

Feature Mat service—This consisted of mats for all the illustrations on the regular feature pages, plus those for the Modes of the Moment page sent only to feature mat subscribers. It included also mats of the text of the serial stories, of the radio column and of some of the other columns. The service cost \$127,143.

[fol. 887] Daily comics and cartoon service. This consisted of twelve daily comic and cartoon panels and strips, including the news cartoon and the sports cartoon. The service cost \$95,922.

The World This Week—This consisted of a weekly news summary page supplied in proofsheet and in mat form. The service cost \$11,542.

Picture Show—This consisted of a weekly page of story-telling pictures, supplied in mat or photo print form. The service cost \$10,752.

Cross-word Puzzles—This consisted of a daily crossword puzzle supplied in mat form. The service cost \$5,342.

Color Comics—This consisted of a weekly service of tabloid-size color comics, supplied in mat or in glossy

print or in readyprint form. The service cost \$91,567.

Background Maps—This consisted of a special mat service, including a map a week for morning paper subscribers and another map a week for afternoon paper subscribers. Supplied in mat or in glossy proof form. The service cost \$28,211.

Special Projects—This consisted of several special projects offered to members on a one-time basis. The projects included three special tabloid supplements known as "War Books" and supplied to members in mat, glossy proof or readyprint form; a non-fiction serial; and reprints of a picture of MacArthur. Figures are incomplete, but costs amounted possibly to \$12,000.

No complete file was kept by The Associated Press of circulars, brochures, and other similar advertising mate-[fol. 888] rial which The Associated Press issued or distributed during the period from January 1, 1937, to date, describing its picture service and its feature services. Such advertising material as has been retained by The Associated Press is now in a folder in the possession of counsel for The Associated Press and is available for inspection by counsel for the plaintiff.

"57. Describe, in such a manner as to permit them to be designated, any reports made by any officer or employee of The Associated Press to the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, or any of the officers of The Associated Press, during the period from January 1, 1937, to date, relating to the character of (a) the AP picture service or (b) any AP feature service."

Ans. Reports made by officers and employees of The Associated Press to the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors and the officers of The Associated Press during the period from January 1, 1937, to date, relating to the character of the AP picture service and the AP feature service are contained in the printed Annual Reports of The Associated Press, a com-

plete set of which is in the possession of the plaintiff. Reports of departmental heads and other employees of The Associated Press were used in the preparation of the reports contained in the Annual Reports and after thus serving their purpose were not kept.
