The world-wide news service of the United Press is used by more than 1,460 newspapers and nearly 500 radio stations.

To speed its news from world capitals and centers of activity around the globe, the United Press employs every modern means of communication—wireless, telex printers, transoceanic cables and telephones.

In the United States alone, 176,000 miles of leased wire are required to carry the United Press news report to newspapers and radio outlets serving communities in all 48 states and the District of Columbia. The United Press is the only press association operating a coast-to-coast wire, supplying news to radio stations exclusively.

Over its numerous news channels, domestic and foreign, are moved an estimated total of 750,000 words daily.

A corps of 1,500 highly trained, full-time correspondents man the 110 United Press bureaus located in every important news center in the world. United Press prides itself on the fact that its key men everywhere are trained in the best traditions of American journalism. Their working creed is accuracy and impartiality. In addition to its full-time correspondents, United Press has another 55,000 con-

From its organization in 1907 the United Press has gathered world-wide news from its independent sources, from its own American-trained correspondents. Likewise since this date it has distributed American news abroad in a constantly growing volume.

Such barriers as existed to free and independent news gathering and distribution throughout the world were leveled by the U. P. very shortly after its organization. The result was a revolution in world news-gathering and distributing methods.

Since 1907, the news of the North American continent has been distributed to newspapers in foreign countries via cable and wireless by the United Press.

The United Press began the sale of world news to the newspapers of Latin America in 1916, more than two years prior to any attempt by any other American news agency to operate in that field which theretofore had been monopolized by the Havas Agency.

United Press newspapers never have been dependent for their world news coverage on the propagandized and often nationally biased services furnished by Reuters (British), Havas (French), or Wolff (German).



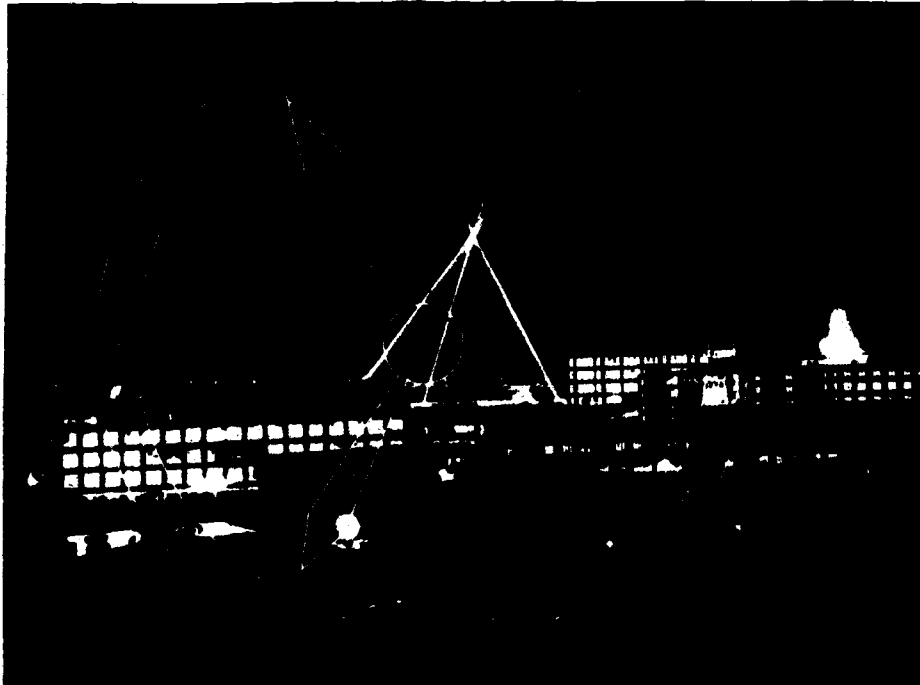

[fol. 1914] AFFIDAVIT OF FRED S. FERGUSON

STATE OF NEW YORK,
COUNTY OF NEW YORK, ss:

FRED S. FERGUSON, being duly sworn, deposes and says:

I am President of NEA Service, Inc., hereinafter referred to as NEA. From 1908 to 1926, I was with United Press and was Vice-President and General News Manager of United Press from 1920 to 1926. The books and records of NEA are in my custody and control. I have personally examined the same and the following facts are true as I verily believe:

NEA is a stock corporation organized for profit in Delaware. The majority of its stock is owned by E. W. Scripps Company. NEA owns all the stock of Acme News-pictures, Inc., a Delaware stock corporation organized for profit, hereinafter referred to as Acme. I am the President of Acme.

The Board of Directors of NEA is composed of the following: Fred S. Ferguson, Ralph H. Turner, Lee B. Wood, Herbert W. Walker, George B. Parker, William W. Hawkins and Roy W. Howard.

NEA, the oldest feature service in the country (1902), is engaged in furnishing to newspapers news pictures by "Telephoto," mat and mail, and a complete feature budget comprising news feature stories by regular staff men, special articles by noted writers, war maps, illustrations, widely recognized comics, cartoons, editorials, magazine pages for Sunday newspapers and other departmental material all shown on Exhibit 1 annexed hereto, and including the Washington Column of Peter Edson, one of the most widely used Washington columns, and outstanding woman's page material.

Acme renders a general all-inclusive news picture coverage from all parts of the world to newspapers in the United States, Canada, Australia, Mexico, South America, Great Britain, United States possessions and many other countries.

[fol. 1915] NEA and Acme are operated on a basis of efficiency of personnel and results obtained by the expenditure of money rather than on a basis of numbers of personnel and mere expenditures.

NEA service is sold on an exclusive basis to newspapers, as a group purchase, in three classifications. The first is the Full Service which includes everything NEA issues for newspaper use. The second is the Intermediate Service which includes a smaller quantity of the same material. The third is the Pony Service which includes a still smaller quantity of the same material.

Its service consists of pictures delivered by Telephoto, *i. e.*, by wire and wireless transmission direct to newspapers in the United States, Canada and Mexico; pictures delivered by airmail, courier, special messenger and train mail and, in general, all types of picture service including special rotogravure picture service used in the production of daily newspapers. Its service includes matted news pictures, such as full picture pages and individual mats.

The number of newspapers receiving picture service from or originated by NEA and ACME was 871 in 1940, 927 in 1941 and 1,060 in 1942. Annexed hereto and marked Exhibit 2 is a statement showing the types of picture serv-

ice rendered or originated by NEA and Acme to its newspaper subscribers in those years. More than 1,000 domestic newspapers receive the feature service of NEA.

The total expenditures of NEA and Acme of conducting the business of their feature and picture services, excluding Federal Income Tax, for the years 1940-1942, inclusive, were:

In each of the years 1940-1942, inclusive, approximately one-half of the aggregate expenditures of NEA and Acme were in connection with their picture service.

Planet News Pictures of London with over 100 employees interchanges pictures with Acme.

Before the outbreak of the present war Acme also maintained bureau offices in Berlin and Paris.

NEA and Acme are represented by UP foreign bureau offices where necessary.

The total number of NEA and Acme employees in August, 1942 was 385.

3 reporters and 6 photographers are presently representing NEA and Acme with the armed forces of the United States.

[fol. 1917] NEA features are sold by it to one newspaper only in a city. The value of any NEA feature to a newspaper subscriber is dependent upon exclusive publication by it of such feature in its city.

Substantially all contracts between Acme or NEA and their newspaper subscribers, both in the United States and Canada, provide that the latter shall furnish to Acme or NEA all pictures collected or received by such newspaper subscribers in the ordinary course of business.

Acme purchased pictures during the years 1941 and 1942 from hundreds of persons and organizations.

Acme has kept a partial record of the "beats" or instances in which the news pictures of Acme have anticipated in time, or otherwise excelled the pictures furnished to newspapers by other picture services, including AP. A partial list of such "beats" is annexed hereto as Exhibit 3.

Annexed hereto and marked Exhibit 4 are copies of typical advertising and promotional material issued and distributed by NEA and Acme during the past 3 years.

Acme maintains a laboratory in Cleveland, Ohio, for scientific experimentation in the transmission of pictures by wire and wireless, etc. NEA owns numerous patents covering the transmission of pictures by wire.

Acme "Telephoto" service sends pictures entirely over telephone lines. It is established on a regional basis and is thus able to give immediate production on all picture news breaks. Pictures by Acme Telephoto cross the continent in 7 minutes.

In 1934 the American Telephone & Telegraph Company offered for sale its apparatus and patents for the wire transmission of pictures with which American Telephone & Telegraph had been experimenting for several years. I

declined to buy the American Telephone & Telegraph apparatus and patents and they were subsequently sold to The Associated Press. The reason I declined to buy the apparatus and patents from American Telephone & Telegraph Company was the cost of utilizing its apparatus in transmitting pictures by wire. NEA and Acme had for several years experimented with the development of picture transmission machines upon which NEA held patents. These machines enabled pictures to be transmitted over ordinary telephone wires at an expense considerably less than that involved in a special leased wire system such as had been used by American Telephone & Telegraph and has since 1935 been used by the AP "Wirephoto" system. NEA and Acme have now, and for some years past, perfected their own picture transmitting machines so that imperfections incident to the transmission of pictures over ordinary telephone wires have been done away with.

At the present time there is no substantial difference between the stability in the flow of current over ordinary telephone wires than over specially leased picture wires nor is the result that pictures transmitted over the AP wire system likely to have less variations in intensity and to be more uniform.

In order to present visually the results of pictures transmitted by wire by Acme "Telephoto" and AP "Wirephoto" there are annexed hereto six sets of pictures. All six pictures are official United States Government photographs, not taken by either AP or Acme. Copies were delivered to Acme in the City of Washington. I am informed by a representative of The Associated Press that identical copies were delivered to AP in the City of Washington.

The Acme set of these pictures was transmitted by the Acme "Telephoto" wire system from Washington to New York and the six pictures annexed as Exhibit 5 listed as Acme pictures are the result of such transmission. I am informed by a representative of The Associated Press that the AP set of these pictures, hereto annexed as Exhibit 5A, listed as AP pictures, are the result of the transmission of these pictures from Washington to New York by the AP "Wirephoto" system.

In my opinion there is no substantial difference in the quality of the pictures resulting from their transmission [fol. 1919] by wire between the Acme "Telephoto" system

and the AP "Wirephoto" system, but the Acme "Telephoto" system is less expensive.

The excellence of the Acme "Telephoto" machines is evidenced by the selection of these machines by the Signal Corps of the United States Army for transmission by it of pictures from numerous war fronts. Acme is a member of the war picture pool which was organized under the orders of the War and Navy Departments. This is a non-exclusive pool to which any reputable organization may be admitted which is able to provide the same number of efficient photographs and the same production facilities as other members of the pool. No accounting is made by the pool. It is completely cooperative and each party is compensated by the others in kind.

The provisions of the contract between Acme and The Chicago Tribune providing for the exclusive use in the City of Chicago by the Chicago Tribune arose at the time Acme purchased P&A Photos, Inc., a company owned by the Chicago Tribune and the New York Daily News. The exclusive provision of the contract was terminated on July 1, 1942. Immediately upon such termination, I endeavored to enter into a contract with the Chicago Sun for the use of Acme pictures and Acme continued so to endeavor but did not succeed in negotiating a contract with the Sun until December 8, 1942.

From December 8, 1942, to the present, responsible employees of the Chicago Sun have frequently expressed praise of the Acme service.

I have read the affidavit of Sid Mautner, filed in behalf of the plaintiff on this motion. Of the 32 pictures listed therein, on pages 208 to 211, of which Mr. Mautner says he "was not able to procure these pictures for the Sun or else did not procure them until after they ceased to be news items", 13 were actually transmitted to the Sun by Acme on the date given in Mr. Mautner's affidavit or the day [fol. 1920] before. Of the remaining 19, virtually all were obviously inconsequential pictures of no news importance.

One of the pictures listed in Mr. Mautner's affidavit, on page 209 under date of January 13, 1943, is the picture of the five Sullivan Brothers who were lost on the same battleship. Acme, in fact, transmitted a picture of the five Sullivan Brothers to the Sun on January 12 at 8:30 P. M. C. W. T., in ample time for its use by the Sun on January 13. Again Mr. Mautner lists, on page 209, under date of

December 28, 1942, a picture of a train wreck at Dixon, Illinois. Dixon is only one hundred miles from Chicago and the story of the wreck was handled as a local story, none of the picture agencies covered it. At page 210, under date of February 12, 1943, Mr. Mautner lists a picture of Marine veterans of Guadalcanal. The fact is that on February 10th, two days earlier, Acme transmitted to the Sun pictures showing Marines on Guadalcanal firing a farewell volley over graves and on February 11th a picture of Marines embarking from Guadalcanal. On page 209, under date of January 8, 1943, Mr. Mautner lists an aerial view of Henderson Field, the airport on Guadalcanal. On December 21, more than two weeks earlier, Acme transmitted aerial views of this field to the Sun. On page 210, under date of February 9, 1943, Mr. Mautner lists a picture of General MacNider recovering from wounds received in action, but the fact is that on February 2nd, a week earlier, Acme transmitted to the Sun a picture of General MacNider convalescing in a hospital in Australia. On the same page, under date of March 3, 1943, Mr. Mautner lists a series of pictures copied from German newspapers showing troops in action in Tunisia. Apparently these pictures were not available either to AP or Acme, but on March 2nd, the day before, between 8:50 and 9:30 A. M., Acme transmitted to the Sun three pictures of German troops in Tunisia. The Sun used only one of these pictures. Also on February 2nd Acme transmitted to the Sun 4 pictures from German sources of Tunisia and North African campaigns. The Sun used none of these pictures.

[fol. 1921] At the opening of the Illinois legislature in January 1943, Acme was the only newspicture agency having wire transmission facilities for the coverage of the legislative session. It maintained a Telephoto transmitting machine in Springfield. The pictures of the opening of the legislature were exclusive to Acme's Chicago clients.

In the period from December 15, 1942 to March 17, 1943, Acme delivered a total of 1,060 pictures by wire (exclusive of mail delivery) to the Chicago Sun and the Chicago Tribune. Of these the Sun used 392, the Tribune 122. Of the 122 used by the Tribune, 67 were not used by the Sun. Obviously the picture editors of the Sun and the Tribune made selections of pictures for use upon the basis of their own judgments.

The pictures which prior to the war had the largest distribution both in the United States and throughout the world were pictures of the Dionne Quintuplets. During the five-year period, 1934-1939, NEA had the exclusive world-wide rights to these pictures.

Neither NEA or Acme have been prevented from getting pictures in the United States or the Dominion of Canada by reason of the provisions of the By-laws of The Associated Press or of the Canadian Press, or otherwise.

Acme does not keep a record of the number of pictures gathered or received by it. No cumulative record is kept to show the number of pictures received from other organizations. The relative importance of news pictures and organizations supplying the same constantly changes by reason of changes in the current importance of news and the availability of news pictures of important events. Approximately 80 news pictures are delivered weekly by Telephoto wire transmission to newspaper subscribers receiving the full service. Approximately 350 additional pictures are delivered during the course of a week to Acme newspaper subscribers by means other than Telephoto wire transmission.

[fol. 1922] Acme maintains a news picture library consisting of more than 1,000,000 pictures.

Annexed hereto, marked Exhibit 6, is a map showing the wire transmission system in the United States used by Acme for the transmission of news pictures by Telephoto.

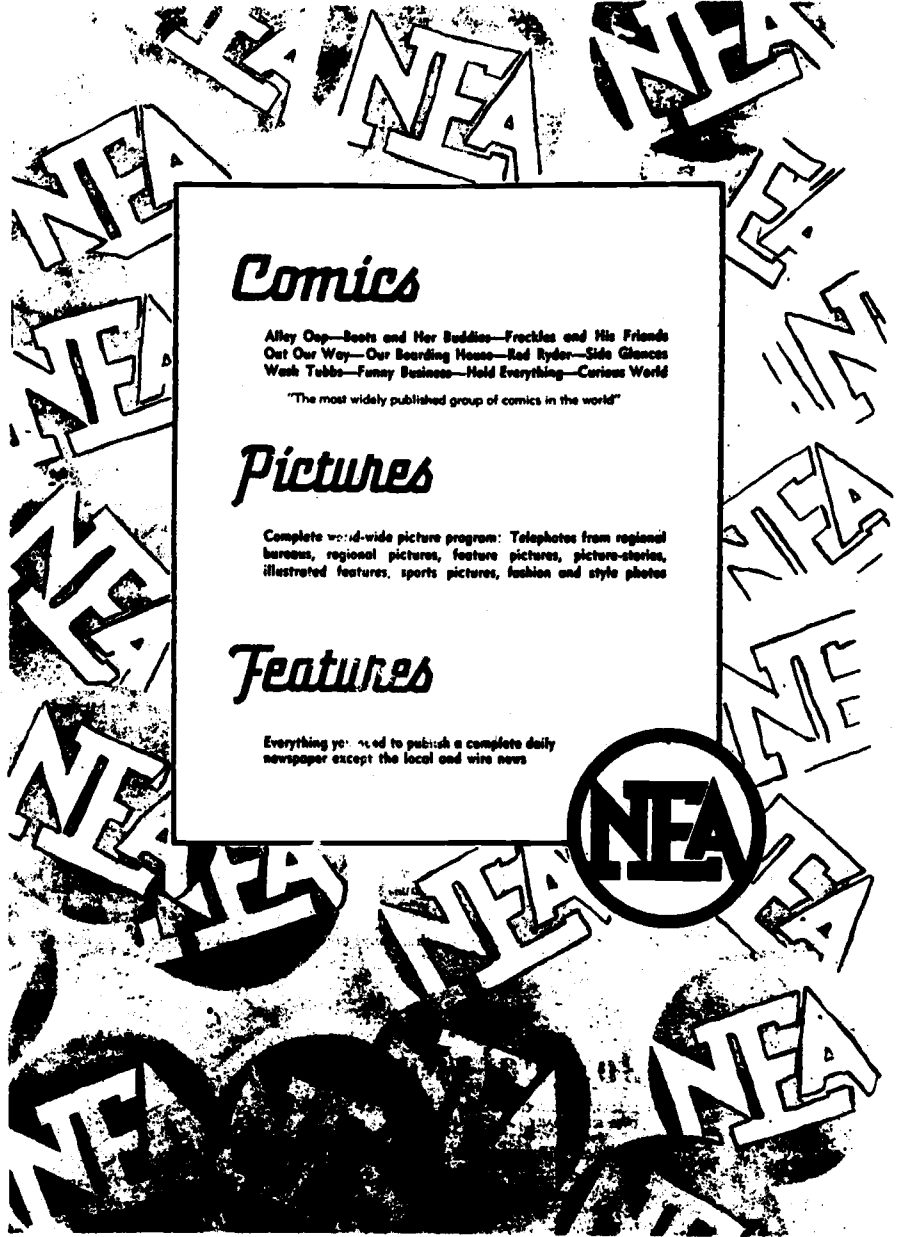

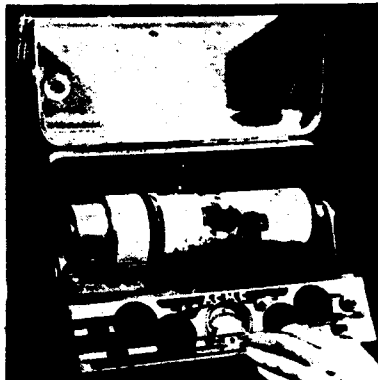

Telephoto Trans-Coverer Is Machine That Makes Service Possible

THE Telephoto Trans-Coverer, which makes this new service possible for (Name Paper), is one of the marvels of modern science. Smaller than a standard-size typewriter, it has the power of drawing far-off scenes through thousands of miles of fine wires, of instantly transporting those scenes intact over mountains, across rivers, valleys and plains.

Fundamentally, this is how the Trans-Coverer works: The photograph to be transmitted is clamped against a drum. A tiny beam of light is thrown against it. The drum rotates, and the beam works its way across the photograph in seven minutes, "scanning" one-hundredth of an inch with each revolution.

Photo-Electric Cell Is Used

Within the machine, a photo-electric cell picks up the light reflected from the photograph. The reflected light varies according to the light and dark parts on the photograph. This light is changed into electric impulses, and sent over the telephone lines, which cause exactly equal fluctuation in a tiny beam of light on the receiving end.

The receiving beam is focused on a regular photographic negative or film which is also clamped to a drum. The beam of light gradually exposes the film as the drum revolves. At the end of seven minutes, the entire negative has been exposed. The exposed negative is taken from the machine and a print made by regular photographic methods.

Plugged Into Any Phone Line

These machines can be plugged into a telephone line anywhere. They can send pictures simultaneously to several cities, so the entire country can be covered in a matter of minutes.

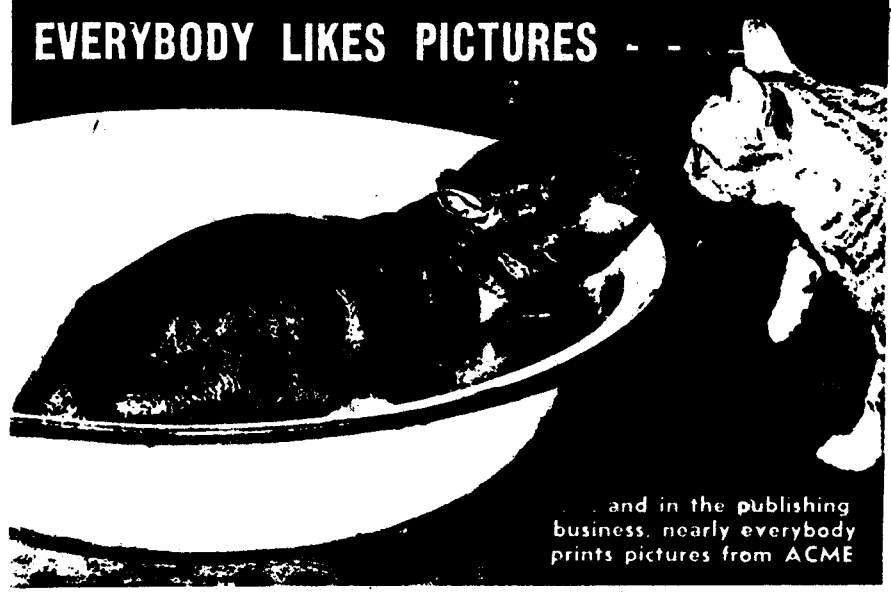

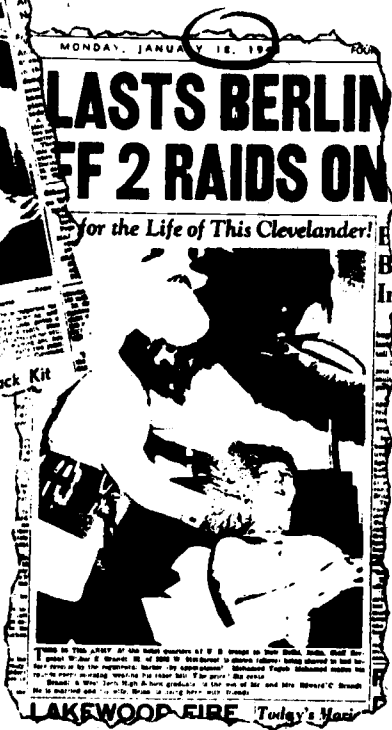

"Women in the Services"

PLEASED with public reaction to other departments of news of men in service, Executive Editor Frank H. Kelly of the *Springfield (Ill.) Daily News* has added to its more regular features. The first... a News of Women in the Services column, a daily feature on the social page, handled by Miss Claire H. Colburn, the woman's page editor. The other is handled by Robert A. P... military editor, and is a weekly feature, carrying quotations from letters from servicemen overseas. A number of letters are carried each week with a brief lead summarizing the subjects and telling some facts about the letter writers. The letters can be on any subject, from such things as trip to battle reactions. Both columns are being well received.

The *Worcester (Mass.) Evening Gazette*, under the title "Women in the Services," also is publishing daily on the women's page news items and thumbnail sketches of women from Worcester and vicinity who are serv-

ing in the armed services. A one column cut accompanies the lead item.

History for New Residents

THIRTY because of the influx of new residents to the Dayton area, a feature tracing the history of the city by Bart Klopfer, who first joined the *Dayton (O.) Journal* staff in 1936, and subsequently has worked a total of 18 years on the paper, proved more popular than expected.

Appearing in Klopfer's "It Happened in Dayton," the series ran in 18 columns. School officials notified the

Journal that the series was being used in their classrooms and it has been suggested the columns be reproduced in booklet form.

Klopfer covered in the series the 146 years since Dayton's first settlers.

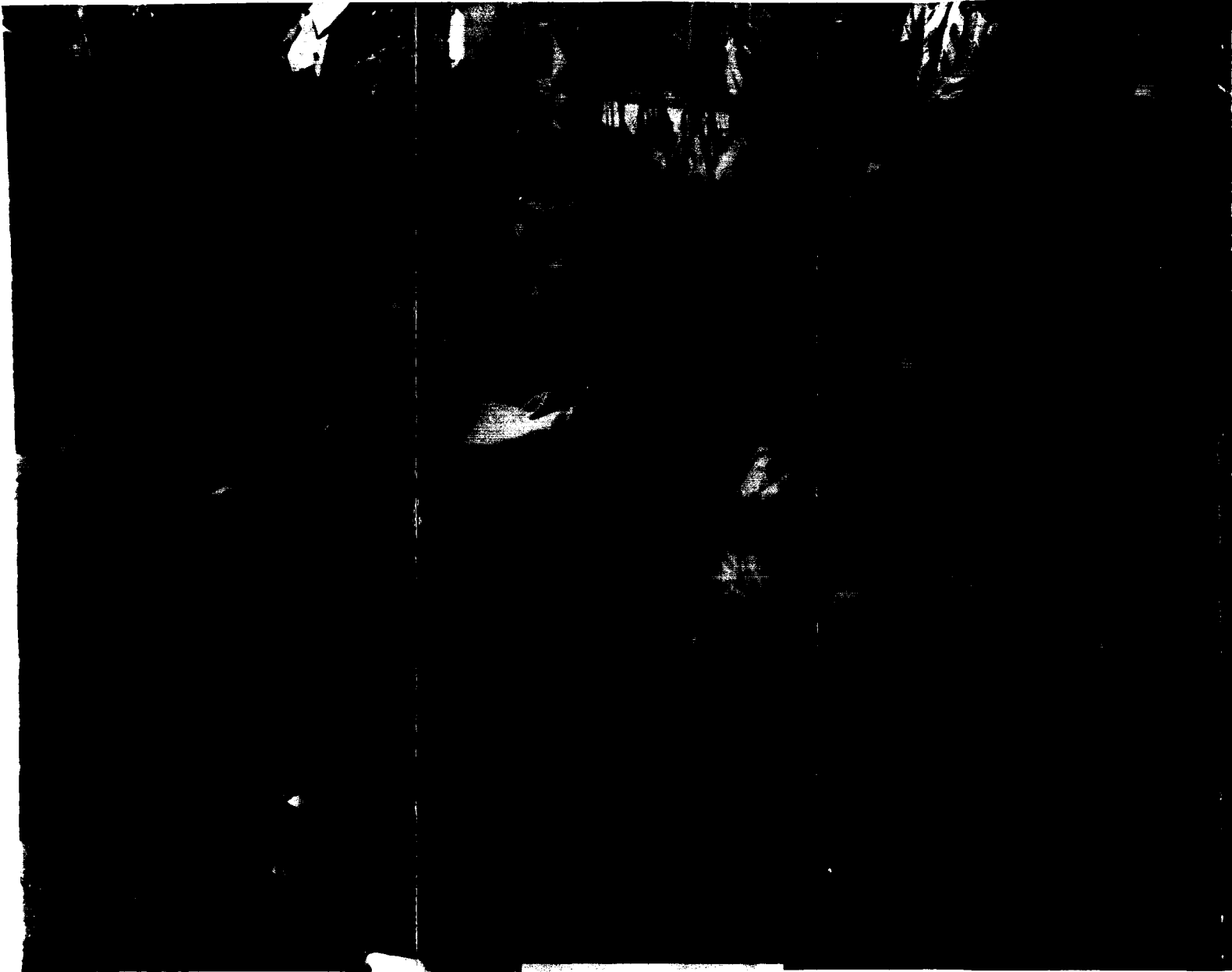
